October signals the start of a very busy month, with lots of awareness days and weeks. As it is the start of Black History Month, each class has been learning about a variety of individuals who have made a difference both in history and today's society, such as Rosa Parks, Ella Fitzgerald, Nina Simone, Ray Charles, Chuck Berry, Marcus Rashford and Nicola Adams.

This week we have been thinking about our value Perseverance and my word it has been demonstrated in abundance this week by everyone, especially the BT engineers who have been onsite for two days this week trying to resolve the phone issues. The children have been very busy in Forest School, they have been learning how to make and manage their own risk assessments when climbing and moving logs, pallets and equipment. Our KS2 children have been using a range of tools this week and our oldest and youngest children throroughly enjoyed the water/ mud slide they made.





Weekly Round Up

Ladybirds

In Ladybirds this week we have continued with our topic 'Marvellous Me' with a focus on our family; the children enjoyed talking about everyone in their family and all the pets they had. They have drawn a picture of their family and had a go at labelling them using their phonics skills to hear the initial sounds. Our phonic sounds this week have been g, o, c, k with a tricky word 'is'.

In mathematics our focus has been size, length and capacity they have had lots of fun exploring filling different size containers with rice, sand or water. They were able to help Finley fish find a way of travelling by investigating which container would hold the most water to safely transport him.

We have enjoyed listening to different kinds of music which reflected various moods, thinking about how it made us feel. We then used this to explore how we could move and dance.

As part of Black History month we have listened to the story of Rosa Parks and acted out being on the bus, taking turns to be Rosa Parks and thinking about how she would have felt. We also found out what the word 'segregation' meant.

Woodland


In English, Woodland class have been planning and writing their own losing tales based on Augustus and His Smile. The children have enjoyed creating their own characters and settings and have been working very hard to remember full stops, finger spaces and capital letters.

In mathematics, Year 1 have been learning to compare objects and numbers using the language of more than, less than and equal to. They have also been learning to order numbers within 10 from smallest to greatest. Year 2 have also been learning to compare numbers and have been ordering numbers within 100.

During our Rainbow Challenge time the children have enjoyed creating observational drawings of conkers and have been investigating their sense of hearing to match sounds to objects.

For Black History Week, we have been learning about the famous footballer Marcus Rashford. The children found out lots of facts about his life and achievements and used these to write an information text about him.





Kestrel


This week in English the children have finished planning their portal stories and have started writing them. I really look forward to reading these when they are finished and finding out which family of creatures their main character met in the world they have been transported to.

In mathematics, 'Dolphins' have been using number lines and have been estimating where different numbers would be on them. 'Nemos' have finished their work on place value by comparing and ordering numbers and also counting in 50s. 'Frogs' began the week by comparing and ordering numbers and then have been looking at rounding numbers to the nearest 10, 100 and 1000.

In science we continued looking at friction and carried out an investigation to look at how the surface can affect how quick an object will slide along it. We had various different surfaces on a ramp and timed how long it took the boat to travel down the ramp. The children made predictions beforehand, considering how the texture of the surface may have an impact on the speed of the boat.







In art the children used flour, lentils and quinoa to recreate the textured surface of a cave wall.

For Black History week, we looked at different black sporting stars and have discussed what challenges they needed to overcome in order to be successful and earn medals. We then focused on Nicola Adams and learnt lots of facts about her and her achievements.

Osprey

This week as part of our Black History Month celebrations, we have enjoyed looking at a variety of influential musicians, in Osprey Class. We are listening to a different artist each morning, so far we have heard from Ella Fitzgerald, Nina Simone, Ray Charles (a particular favourite) and Chuck Berry. We have also started looking at the lyrics to a Sam Cooke song, "A Change is Gonna Come, "in our Guided Reading class, which we will continue with next week.

On Wednesday this week, an alarm went off in Osprey class to tell us that we all had to stop what we were doing.... and READ! We really appreciated having the time to sit quietly and just read our books, Mrs Hodgson and Miss McKeown also enjoyed being able to read their books too. Perhaps over the weekend you could all try this, the children really enjoyed it!

We are still loving our class book, "Secrets of a Sun King," and can't wait to finish it before half term. We even found out how the Egyptians mummified people, whilst reading it, it's pretty gruesome though! As part of our Egyptian topic we finished writing our Howard Carter diary entry, after getting inspiration from a BBC Drama based on the discovery of Tutankhamun.
