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Dear Families,

This week we have been thinking about our school Golden Rules, how we can demonstrate them, help others uphold them and the impact they have on us in and out of school. Each class is rewarded with some Golden Time on a Friday afternoon where they have the opportunity to have some choosing time as a reward for keeping our Golden Rules across the week. Everyone has the opportunity to earn more Golden Time for their class through their class rewards and very occasionally Golden Time minutes can be lost due to incidents across the week. Lost Golden Time can be earnt back if there has been significant improvements in behaviour or attitude to learning.

During Family Time this afternoon the whole school found out about Candlemas (which is Sunday 2nd February) and why this is an important date in the Christian calendar. We found out that Candlemas marks the end of the Christmas – Epiphany season and is 40 days after Christmas. It commemorates the presentation of Jesus at the Temple. As part of our learning we looked at Christingles and found out what each part of a Christingle symbolised, we enjoyed making our own Christingles. During Worship, Reverend Mark asked us to help him build his Christingle, we had some time of reflection as we lit the Christingles and thought about our week, the impact of our actions on others and how we were wonderfully unique and special.









Pebbles

We started the week meeting Katie the veterinary nurse, she showed us how she listens to Zog's heart and some of us enjoyed using her stethoscope to listen to his heart too! We told Katie about our own pets and listened to how she cares for poorly animals. We also had a visit from our local police officers who told us about what they do and showed us the equipment they carry with them.

We found out about Chinese New Year and made a Chinese Dragon, we enjoyed dancing to the dragon music and we have enjoyed playing in the Chinese restaurant. We have been using chopsticks and tongs to help develop our fine motor control!









Ladybirds

We have had a very busy week in Ladybirds; Katie the veterinary nurse came in on Monday to talk to all the children about her job. Zog was a very willing patient and allowed the children to listen to his heart with a stethoscope. We also had a visit from the police, they enjoyed chatting to the children sharing ways in which they help us. We also had a look at all that a police officer carries in their vest; including handcuffs, a note book and walkie talkies.









Alongside this we have been finding out about Chinese New Year. The children listened to the story about how the animals for the zodiac were decided, they thought about which animal they would be in the race and why. We have found out that it is the Year of the Snake and how to say Happy New Year; Kung Hei Fat Choi. We have read stories to find out about the traditions linked to the Chinese New Year and the preparations involved; including cleaning the house and wearing new clothes. We have enjoyed trying our hand at some Chinese writing, making Chinese dragons and lanterns. We have also had lots of fun with our dragon dancing. Our favourite activity was trying different Chinese food!







In mathematics we have been working on numbers 6,7 and 8, sorting different ways these are represented, building these on a 10 frame and finding 1, more and 1 less.

In phonics our sounds of the week are air and er plus looking at double letters. Our tricky words are pure, sure and are.

Woodland Class

In English, Woodland Class have been innovating their focus text 'Monstersaurus'. This week, the children have been busy planning their portal stories by changing characters, settings and portals. The children have also started writing the opening of their stories using their action toolkit. I look forward to reading their finished stories next week.

In mathematics, Year 1 have finished their unit on place value. This week, the children have been comparing numbers and finding one more and one less than a given number. Year 2 have been learning about money. This week they have been counting pounds and pence and have been selecting coins and notes to make an amount.

In science, the children have been learning about natural and man-made materials. The children first researched different materials such as wood, paper, rubber and polyester before sorting objects into a Venn diagram.

In history, Woodland Class have been learning about historical sources and how they help us to learn about the past. The children identified a selection of sources from the Great Fire of London such as a leather bucket, diary entries and newspapers. We then thought about how reliable they were and what they could us about the fire.

As part of our learning in RE we looked at a Jewish Seder plate, we had the opportunity to try parsley dipped in salt water, hard boiled egg, horseradish, romaine lettuce and matzo crackers.







Kestrel Class

In English, we have continued our focus on inverted commas to prepare us for writing our own versions of the text next week. We did lots of drama activities, including freeze frames and miming, to embed our understanding of the text further.

In mathematics, Nemos have continued learning about length and perimeter. We have been looking at equivalent lengths in metres, centimetres and millimetres. We also have been comparing and adding lengths. Frogs have started the new unit on length and perimeter. We have been measuring in kilometres and metres, and learning about equivalent lengths.

In history, we have been learning about the longships that the Vikings used to invade the UK. We learnt about the different parts of the boat and discussed how they would have been made. We also made some longship models and created some oil pastel paintings of the boats.

We have continue to work as a team in our Whole Class Practical Musicianship and have been concentrating on keeping in time with our drumming beats whilst learning a new chant.







Osprey Class

Out topic this week introduced us to some new terms such as democracy and philosophy, as we have been finding out the legacies that the Ancient Greeks left behind. This week in English we have started innovating our Greek Myth. We are using the text map to help innovate our stories, to make them our own.

In mathematics we have been looking at decimals and fractions. We have been using the decimal counters and place value charts to find equivalents. We have been using tenths, hundredths and the Year 6s have been using thousandths as well.

We have started a new topic in computing. This term we will be creating our own stop motion, animation film. We started off by looking at different types of animations, that people have used in the past.





Barn Owls

In English this week, we have become authors and have written our own warning stories. Each one is unique and full of our own ideas.

In mathematics, we have been learning about measuring. We have looked at different units of measurements including millimetres, centimetres and metres. We have compared and considered the appropriateness of different units of measurement.
